A YEAR IN THE LIFE OF RASHAD

REGENNIA N. WILLIAMS PHD, FOUNDER AND DIRECTOR

In Depression-era Cleveland, two African American men launched organizations that would play a vital role in shaping the history of religion and spirituality in this city and throughout America. In 1937, Reverend Glenn T. Settle, pastor of the Gethsemane Baptist Church, founded the WGAR Negro Hour Radio Choir, which later became the Wings Over Jordan choir. In that same year, Imam Wali A. Akram organized the First Cleveland Mosque, and the rest, as they say, is history! In 2007, the first year in the life of RASHAD, we joined hundreds of Clevelanders in celebrating the pioneering efforts and enduring legacies of Reverend Settle and Imam Akram.

The photographs and articles in this issue of Traditions and Beliefs provide abundant evidence of our work with Wings Over Jordan Alumni and Friends, Inc. The Wings Over Jordan 70th Anniversary Celebration is generating a lot of interest in our initiative, and our work is creating new opportuni-

ties for performing artists, educators, students, and scholars across the state and across the country, including those at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.



RESEARCH PROJECT FOCUSES ON PUBLIC INFLUENCES OF AFRICAN AMERICAN CHURCHES

We contributed to the research project entitled "Church and State: Greater Cleveland's African American Faith Communities and Public Policy." We set out to compile a comprehensive list of religious institutions in the seven counties comprising Northeast Ohio. Mr. Brian McNamara in the Levin College's Northern Ohio Data Information Service Office (NODIS) provided us with a preliminary database from an earlier "Sacred Landmarks" project. Research involving the Internet, other printed lists, and newspapers produced additional data, including missing phone numbers for some institutions. We then organized the data into one master spreadsheet.

The database contains information on more than 3,000 religious institutions. In the spring semester of 2008, RASHAD will use this database to complete survey research designed to measure the public influences of African American churches. This survey work, part of Dr. Regennia N. Williams' sabbatical research project, is supported by the Office of the Vice President for Institutional Diversity.

On another note, we provided staff support for two programs organized by the History Department, where lectures were delivered by the Rev. Dr. R. Drew Smith and Nana Kwabena Brown. Both programs were well attended, and audience members— based on feedback in the program evaluations— were highly appreciative. (continued on page 4)
